Foreword

"Students from nine agricultural colleges competed in the first butter judging contest held at the National. The Massachusetts Society for the Promotion of Agriculture gave very liberal prizes for winning teams and individuals, and it was largely instrumental in making their contest possible."

Sixty-five years later, in Atlanta, November 16, 1981, the Inter-collegiate Dairy Products Judging Contest celebrated its 60th Contest, with 25 teams competing for 35 prizes and trophies.

What a contrast! What an achievement! Between 1916 and 1980 three generations of college students have been trained in the art of evaluating the sensory qualities of butter, milk, cheddar cheese, vanilla ice cream, cottage cheese and strawberry yogurt. Little wonder that America today leads the world in overall taste quality of her chief dairy products.

This booklet commemorates the students, judges, colleges, industry officials and organizations who have participated in 60 years of successful intercollegiate judging from 1916 to 1981.

The emphasis of the booklet is on the years of the sixth decade, from 1972 to 1980, which supplements the history of the first 50 years published in 1972.

The contest has been enthusiastically co-sponsored by a number of national associations, a team effort which has enhanced its stature and contributed to its success over the years. Their logos identify their participation as a cosponsor of the contest.





The Contest Superintendents


Contest rules have specified that the contest shall be supervised by a member of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This has been followed virtually to the letter. The succession of superintendents has been as follows: S.C. Thompson, William White, C.J. Babcock, Byron H. Webb, Louis H. Burgwald, Harold E. Meister, and Joseph A. Rubis, the present superintendent. To them go the responsibility of administering the many facets of the contest, making for a successful competition from the opening signal to final awards.

Contest Secretariat

The contest secretariat has changed in the years 1972–1981. Beatrice Prescott, long-time enthusiast for the contest, retired and was succeeded by George W. Weigold, Dairy Society International, member of the Connecticut judging team, Cleveland, 1934. The staging of the contest rests upon his shoulders. The supervision of securing, storing, delivering and judging of six different dairy products is a demanding task. The necessary correspondence with coaches and the colleges and universities assures all of a well organized program.

The Official Judges

A continuity of product judges fosters the establishment of sensory standards on which the coaches base their product evaluations. In time, the roster of official judges will change. But, for the most part, the official judges for 1981 were on duty in 1972. The senior official judges are: butter, Bert Aldrich, Roy's Dairy, Inc.; cheddar cheese, Robert Johns, and John Ellingson, Dart-Kraft, Inc.; milk, Ellen Spear, Beatrice Foods Co.; ice cream, Bruce Tharp, Germantown Manufacturing Co.; cottage cheese, Francis Lavicky, Nordica International; strawberry yogurt, David Weddle, Mid-America Dairymen, Inc.; and All Products, George Muck, Dean Foods Co. Each senior judge is served by one or more associate judges and two coach judges. The Contest and Fellowship Committee of DFISA monitors the conduct of the students.




Industry Participation

The past nine years of dairy products judging has witnessed a marked increase in participation from the industry. The contest takes on greater significance through the active role of industry leaders in each year's contest. Contestants sense their presence and return to their respective universities with an understanding that industry welcomes them as future leaders.

Sites of the Contests

The contests have been held in conjunction with a dairy convention or Expo. From 1916 through 1929, the contest was associated with the annual National Dairy Show. Since then, affiliation has been with Dairy and Food Industries Supply Association, Inc. and/or the Milk Industry Foundation/International Association of Ice Cream Manufacturers. Their expositions or annual meetings have been held in 26 cities of the United States and Canada (Table 1). Two cities—Atlantic City and Chicago—have been the sites of the contest for 11 and 9 years, respectively, together hosting 39.1 percent of the 1,128 teams entered from 1916–1980.




Raymond Mykleby, executive vice president of Dairy Research Inc., studied under a dairy industry research fellowship at the University of Minnesota in 1940.






Everybody is a Winner

The uniqueness of the Intercollegiate Dairy Products Evaluation Contest is that there are no losers, only winners. Yet, in the American way, recognition is given to those few showing excellence in their work. Regardless of proficiency in judging, the reaction of all contestants, even years afterward, is often that "I wish I could do it all over again." The "loser" always "wins", by gaining knowledge of quality in dairy products; enjoying a special undergraduate experience to be remembered for life; visiting a national exposition; associating with rival students from other universities; seeing new parts of America; sensing the enthusiasm and loyalty of leaders in the dairy industry; fulfilling the ambition to achieve, and testing proficiency in an art in a national competition. Overall participation in the national contest is an unforgettable undergraduate experience—win or lose.

University Participation

Annual team participation from the various colleges and universities has been relatively high (Fig. 1). The number varies yearly depending on location of the contest. A geographically centered site plus affiliation with Food and Dairy Expo generally yield a large number of team entries. The average number of teams entered annually during the 59-year period was 19; for the last nine years it has been 21. Coincidentally, 59 different colleges and universities have entered teams in the 59 contests held from 1916 to 1980 (Table 2). Eleven universities have entered teams in over 66.6 percent of the 59 contests. Ohio State University ranks first in total team participations, averaging 94.9 percent of the 59 contests. Six universities—Minnesota, Mississippi State, Missouri, Oklahoma State, Oregon State, and South Dakota State—had perfect participation records during the decade 1972–1980. Three schools—lowa State, Ohio State, and Pennsylvania State—missed perfect attendance by only one entry each.




Growth of the Intercollegiate Dairy Products Evaluation Contest, 1916–1980



Coach of the Year

In the latter years of the contest, special recognition has been accorded the coach of the team ranking first in judging All Products. This gesture is most appropriate and well received. The award reflects devotion to the project, competitive spirit, superb coaching, and a "thank you" for a job well done. The bestowing of the Coach-of-the-Year Award at the close of the awards program is heart warming for the audience and an emotional experience for team members. Those receiving this coveted recognition, 1972–1980, are listed in Table 3.

Dr. Elmer Thomas retired in 1981 after coaching every University of Minnesota judging team from 1949 to 1980 (except for two years while on sabbatical leave). His teams, pictured above, never finished out of the top ten, winning first place in All Products twice and in individual competition nearly every year.

Team Standings

Those teams ranking highest in the judging from 1916–1980 are presented in Table 4. Only 11 of 59 teams participating have placed first in the All Products category. Teams from Ohio State and Iowa State have dominated the field, finishing first 42.1 percent of the time. Teams from Illinois, South Dakota State and Mississippi State have also done a most creditable job in the national competition.

For the past nine years from 1972–1980 a change was made in the teams ranking first in judging All Products (Table 5). The table shows the "batting averages" of the first-place teams and individuals. Thus, Illinois (31 entries) is tied with Ohio State (56 entries), winning 25 percent of the years entered. In the table, Ohio State is listed ahead of Illinois because it has entered more competitions, 56 vs. 36. Note also that teams from South Dakota State, coached by Professor Shirley Seas, have won four All Products firsts in the nine-year period, 1972–1980, equalling the number of its team wins in 31 previous contests, 1916—1971.

Cream of the Crop

Team Winners

Teamwork produces a champion in all walks of collegiate life. In scholastic achievement, the arts, athletics, science and the professions, excellence is accomplished through instruction, training, skill, hard work and loyalty. The teams which have excelled in 60 years of collegiate judging exemplify these traits. They have brought credit to themselves, their coaches, universities and a great industry in which they seek their careers.

Butter. South Dakota State teams have compiled a remarkable record in judging butter, ranking first 16 times in 59 years of the contest for a 27.1 percent score (Table 4, see page 7–8). Based on the number of years in the competition (44), South Dakota State ranked first in butter 36.4 percent of the time, an impressive achievement.


Most astounding, however, is the South Dakota State team record during the sixth decade, 1972–1980, when Shirley Seas' teams won first place in butter judging eight consecutive years in the nine-year period, 1972–1980, for a 88.9 percent ranking. They missed a perfect record by placing second to Illinois in butter judging in 1972. What an achievement! Fifteen universities have ranked first in butter judging during 59 years of competi-

tion. Teams from Iowa State also gave excellent accounts of themselves in butter judging, winning first place 11 times in 59 contest years, for a 18.6 percent rating.


Cheddar cheese. Eighteen different teams ranked first in cheddar cheese judging during 58 years of competition. Ohio State predominated with eight firsts for a 13.8 percent ranking, followed by Iowa State, Minnesota and Illinois with six, five, and five wins, respectively. During nine contests of the decade from 1972–1980, teams from Missouri and Wisconsin each placed first twice.

Milk. Over the 58 years of milk judging, teams from Ohio State prevailed, winning first place 10 times for a 17.2 percent score. Twenty-two different schools have place first in the period 1917–1980. During nine years of the current decade, six schools have placed first, South Dakota State and Missouri taking the top honor two times each.

ICE CREATM. Teams from 19 colleges have place first in 50 years of ice cream judging. Over the years, Iowa State, Ohio State and Illinois have predominated with seven, seven and six firsts, respectively.

Coffage cheese. This product was added to the contest in 1962. Teams from Ohio State and South Dakota State have ranked first in cottage cheese three times each, totaling 31.6 percent. Teams from 11 universities have placed first.

Yogurf. Strawberry yogurt was first introduced to the intercollegiate judging competition in 1978. Teams from the University of Missouri won the first three of the four contests for a 75 percent average.







Individual Winners

All Products. A close relationship exists between the teams and the individuals winning first place in the judging of the six products and All Products. Often the individual winning first place may not be a member of the team winning first and vice versa. Nonetheless, teams taking the top honor usually have one or more of the top individuals on the team. In 57 contests, Ohio State has produced a first-ranking judge of All Products 13 times or 22.8 percent of the time (Table 6). Illinois is second and Iowa State third, with nine and eight individual winners, respectively. Sixteen schools have trained leading all products winners. Not all schools, however, have entered teams in the contests as often as Ohio State, which has participated in 56. The three schools with first ranking teams in All Products were also leaders with top ranking individuals. These were Ohio State, Iowa State and Illinois, participating in 56, 52, and 36 contests, respectively.

Butter. Iowa State and South Dakota State each have produced 10 first-place winners in the individual butter competition. Sixteen schools have been so honored. Six schools—Iowa State, South Dakota State, Minnesota, Oregon State, Illinois, and Mississippi State—have accounted for 43 individual winners in 59 butter judging contests for a 72.9 percent rating.

Cheddar cheese. Individuals from Mississippi State outrank Ohio State's by one year in evaluating Cheddar cheese, winning seven and six first places, respectively. Individuals from 24 different schools have finished first one or more times in 58 years of Cheddar cheese judging.

Milk. Individuals from Ohio State teams have placed first 12 times in 58 years of milk judging for a 20.7 percent standing. Three schools—Iowa State, University of Illinois, and South Dakota State—each have had five first-place winners. In all, 22 colleges have had winning individuals one or more times in 58 years of milk judging.

Ice Cream. Ice Cream was introduced to competitive judging at Detroit in 1926. In 50 contests, 24 schools have yielded first-place winners. Three schools—Iowa State, Mississippi State and Michigan State—tie at four each for the top ranking in ice cream. Five other schools each have had winning individuals three times, four schools have each won twice, and 11 schools have each had one first-place winner in ice cream. **Cottage cheese.** A relative newcomer in contestant judging, cottage cheese was introduced in 1962. Individuals from three schools—Nebraska, Mississippi State, and Minnesota—tie at three each in proficiency at judging cottage cheese. Three other schools—Iowa State, South Dakota State, and Kansas State—each have had ranking individuals twice. In 19 years of competition, individuals from 10 schools have placed first one or more times in cottage cheese.


Yogurt. In four years of judging strawberry yogurt, individuals from four different universities have captured first place. Individuals from Michigan State led off in 1977, followed by Wisconsin, Ohio State and Missouri in 1978, 1979 and 1980, respectively.




The body and texture of strawberry yogurt is examined by a 1978 contestant. Yogurt, the newest product category, was added in 1977.



Epilogue

The Second Contest at Columbus in 1917 was a near failure with only three teams entered, two from outstate—Nebraska and South Dakota State.

"The students' judging contest for dairy products was carried on under adverse conditions this year . . . It cost more money to run our contest than to run the cattle judging contest . . . It would seem that the judging of dairy products deserves pretty nearly as good a place as the judging of cattle, and we can get it; but the attitude is not towards it; and we will have to create this attitude. . . . When we find a high grade of butter, score it, discuss it and carry back to our institutions the ideas and standards that we will have to meet in our production. . . . I believe manufacturers will put up a manufacturer's scholarship. Possibly a group of manufacturers or interested men, may be persuaded to contribute a small amount each for its support."
